THE PASTOR'S PAGE

In the spring of 1980, I gathered with several friends to play a “final” round of golf with them. We figured it would probably be the last time the eight of us would tee it up together, with college graduation, family responsibilities, continuing education, work, and geography all factoring against us in the future. Three of the eight had talked the night before about making the proposition that once a year we would set aside everything that could get in the way, and gather to play a round of golf.

The years, thirty-two of them to be precise, have passed, and seven of the eight who gathered for the “final round” in 1980 still make the annual pilgrimage to Ohio. The wife of one of the seven stepped in as a temporary substitute in 1992, and has played ever since as one of the eight decided he no longer wished to participate. This August we only had seven in attendance, as one came up with the really lame excuse of having a hip replacement in July which he could not postpone until after the golf gathering. Being understanding friends, we sadly told him it was OK, on the condition of course that he present a doctor’s slip next year excusing his absence.

Each year as I make the eight hour return trip to Illinois from the golf outing, I begin to think about the months ahead, especially September through December. On one such return trip in 1996, I decided I ought to contact an individual whom I had never met named Sara to see if she would be open to the possibility of going out on a date with me. (No, her name just did not come to me out of the blue. I had received her name from a friend.) So I did, even though she lived

in Macomb and I lived in Coatsburg. But, that is a story for another pastoral column sometime in the future.

Last year, as I was returning, I considered the possibility of asking the members and former members of Trinity to volunteer to write a brief half page article on specific topics relating to Christmas, compile them into a booklet, and distribute them for people to use at home as their Advent devotional material. I would provide a scripture verse and a short paragraph linking the topic to our observance of Advent. In late August, an email was sent to the former members asking them to volunteer, and in September a sign up sheet was in the narthex for volunteers. By mid-November the booklets had been assembled and were distributed. Many positive comments were made by those who used the booklet, as they read and reflected upon writings ranging from first grader Maylin Bacon to those authored by some of our oldest members.

So, as I was returning this year, it seemed only appropriate as I considered the months ahead, that we attempt a similar project this year. We will need six fewer volunteers this time. In 2011 with Christmas Day falling on a Sunday, the season of Advent stretched to its maximum length of twenty-eight days. This year, with December 25th being on a Tuesday, the season of Advent is close to its minimum length of twenty-two days. A sign up sheet will appear in September, with the topics listed, and once again volunteers will not need to include any scripture with their writing as I will do that.

I realize that discussing an Advent devotional booklet in the September newsletter seems a bit odd, but seeking to have the volunteers' original compositions turned into the office by early November, I wanted to provide plenty of time for people to consider contributing to the booklet and for the process to unfold.

But, if I'm going to discuss something odd, I might as well do it in the month named **SEPT**ember, (meaning the seventh month), which of course, it is a bit odd in itself.

Returning to the initial paragraphs of this column; for seven of the eight golfers who agreed to gather yearly, their affirmation of the proposal to do so on that spring day in 1980 still is a binding commitment. Each of us has received a commitment by God in the waters of baptism, claimed and named as one of God's precious and beloved children. We have received a commitment by God through the Sacrament of Holy Communion that our sins are forgiven and we are strengthened for God's service. We also made a commitment when we affirmed our baptism that we would "reject sin", "proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed, serve all people following the example of Jesus, and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth." Regardless of how many years that pass, God remains faithful to God's commitment to us. Hopefully we will do the same with our commitment to God.

Remodeling the Basement

The Property Committee has been involved with some pretty extensive remodeling of the old nursery. Some problems with the floor and wall surfaces have slowed our progress. We are scheduled to have linoleum laid on September 24 with an anticipated date of completion for the old nursery project by September 28.

We are still in the planning stages of remodeling the basement where the Sunday School opening is held and the choir practices. Our goal is to make this area brighter and more inviting. We are planning new carpet, new paint color on the walls, new 2 X 2 ceiling tiles, new florescent suspended ceiling lights, a double door installation between this room and the kitchen, moving of the bulletin boards, painting of woodwork and painting of the older wooden doors.

The anticipated cost of remodeling the basement area where the Sunday School opening is held is estimated between \$10,000 and \$12,000. This project will require approval of the congregation (vote will probably occur at the annual meeting in January) because the anticipated cost is above the spending limit our church council has without congregational approval. Therefore, please consider approving our remodeling plan and cost of the project.

If you have questions, ideas or concerns about the basement project, please speak with me.

Adult Sunday School Starts Sept 16!

Have you ever thought about the great variety of images for God we have as Christians? God is Lord, Monarch, Father or Parent, in Jesus a co-sufferer with us, a Holy Wind ... there are many biblically inspired images for God. The ways we image God tell us a lot about how we envision God relating to the world and to humankind.

The first topic of discussion for the Sunday adult ed class this year is a study of one book that takes up these questions, Flora Keshgegian's *God Reflected: Metaphors for Life* (Fortress Press, 2008). While everyone with the time to do so is encouraged to find and read the book (we'll do—hopefully—about a chapter a week), you do NOT need to own or read it to participate in the class. Each week a handout will be provided on each chapter of this book, which is written to be a study guide for small groups. If you do want to read the book and are having trouble affording it or securing a copy, speak to me at the first class meeting and I'll work something out. Regardless, if the topic interests you, come and join in the conversation.

The first meeting for the adult Sunday School class is September 16. That day we'll have an orientation to the topic of images for God, but not start reading Keshgegian's book until the following week. Everyone is also encouraged to join the Sunday School kids at 9:00 a.m. on September 9 to put together Lutheran World Relief kits.

We meet downstairs by the kitchen each Sunday at 9:00 a.m. All are welcome to join us!

100 Wells Challenge Update

The congregation received a letter of thanks from the ELCA for the \$748 raised during June, when it was the mission of the month project. Congregations like Trinity, together with the ELCA Youth Gathering, raised more than \$400,000 for the project.



The letter goes on: "Thanks to your generosity, an engineer builds concrete spring boxes in the most remote areas of the Central African

Republic and teaches villagers how and why to use them. The women and children who are most often responsible for obtaining their families daily water save hours of walking back and forth to the old well each day—time they can now devote to earning an income or going to school to ensure a brighter future. To neighbors who thirst for clean water, gifts like yours bring not only help, but hope."

It sounds like this was a very successful project all the way around. If we hear more about changes in the lives of people because of new wells or easier access to water, we'll pass the information along.

Coming in October: Trinity's Commitment to Lutheran Social Services

Delegates at the synodical conference this year significantly reduced the budget line item for support of Lutheran Social Services of Illinois. Following adoption of that budget, Pastor Thomas made a commitment for Trinity to raise \$3,000 by the end of 2013 to help make up for reduction in synodical support of their important work.

Our first effort to raise funds to support LSSI will be during the month of October.

Central Southern Illinois Synod to Host Hearings on the Draft Social Statement on Criminal Justice

A listening post for member feedback

The ELCA is preparing a social statement that addresses issues in criminal justice. The 2013 Churchwide Assembly, it is anticipated, will consider the proposed social statement.

The draft of the social statement affirms the fundamental principles of the U.S. criminal justice system but also hears the cries that reflect the system's serious deficiencies. Drawing from the biblical witness to God's wondrously rich forms of love and justice, the ELCA is compelled by a "holy yearning" to address the need for change and improvement. The ELCA through its members and various expressions are called to strengthen or take up responsive ministries. In addition, drawing on evidence and data, the ELCA is compelled to speak publicly to commend positive efforts but also to identify areas in the criminal justice system that require reform.

Our synod will be hosting two hearings for members to comment on the text of the Draft Social Statement on Criminal Justice.

These hearings are a key part in the development of the social statement. Representatives of both the synod and the Criminal Justice Task Force will be present. A synod representative will be present to record all comments made by participants. The minutes from the hearing will be submitted to the task force and considered as they revise the text for 2013.

"It is important that we have as many members as possible participating in this step of the process," said Bishop S. John Roth of the Central/Southern Illinois Synod. "Participation in this hearing is part of how we develop social statements in this church. The hearing is a chance to both speak and listen, both necessary components to being a community of moral deliberation."

The comments made at the synodical hearings are critical to the task force in the development of the social statement. They will use these comments to revise the draft. The revised draft, which will be called the Proposed Social Statement on Criminal Justice, will be released in February 2013.

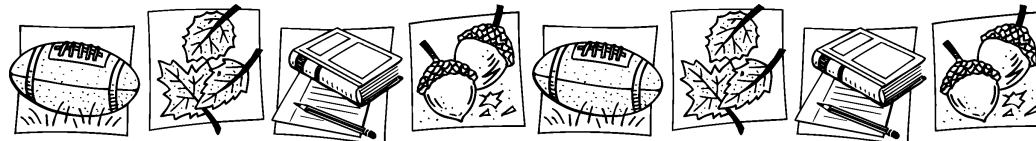
